NSPCC Sponsored Workout

Last week Years 1-6 took part in a sponsored workout to raise money for the NSPCC. The children worked extremely hard to complete an 18 minute circuit that had 6 different stations. At each station the children had to apply different skills, such as: skipping, running, jumping and hula-hooping. With perseverance and encouragement the children supported each other to complete the circuit as well as having fun and enjoying themselves! Holland Haven would like to thank you for sponsoring the children and supporting the NSPCC. In total we raised £946.50!

Open-Door Sessions

Just a reminder that each class teacher offers an open-door session, usually on Wednesdays. (Where this differs due to staff running clubs etc, the class teacher can tell you which day they are available). This is an opportunity for you to meet with your child's class teacher, on your own, in a protected time slot. The early morning drop off can be very busy within the classroom environment and teachers and pupils are ready to start their lessons.

Attendance

Over the last few years Holland Haven has had acceptable attendance of 96% or over. Attendance is one area which is closely monitored by the Local Authority and OFSTED. It is essential for our school to remain good that we continue to have good attendance. If pupils are not in school they are not accessing their learning. Currently our attendance is 95.8%, this time last year we were 97.1%. This is the lowest it has been for a number of years. This is due to holidays being taken during term time. I do absolutely understand wow expensive it is to take holidays during school holidays but having low attendance is seen as a huge issue for any school.

Our Attendance policy, which can be seen on our website, now states that we will be calling you **every day** (if you do not call us) to ask why your child is not in school. We have attached parental advice from the NHS regarding illnesses and school attendance which states if your child has a minor cough, cold, headache or sore throat they can still attend school.

Please help us improve our attendance.



Parental advice from The NHS regarding illnesses and school attendance

If your child is ill, it's likely to be due to one of a few minor health conditions. Whether you send your child to school will depend on how severe you think the illness is. This guidance can help you make that judgement. Not every illness needs to keep your child from school. If you keep your child away from school, be sure to inform the school on the first day of their absence. Use common sense when deciding whether or not your child is too ill to attend school.

Cough and Cold	A child with a minor cough or cold may attend school. If the cold is accompanied by a raised temperature, shivers or drowsiness, the child should stay off school and visit the GP. If your child has a more severe and long-lasting cough, consult you GP. They can give guidance on whether the child should stay off school.	The school will not normally authorise an absence for coughs and colds without medical evidence.
Raised temperature	If your child has a raised temperature, they should not attend school.	
Rash	Rashes can be the first sign of many infectious illnesses, such as chickenpox and measles. Children with these conditions should not attend school.	If your child has a rash, check with your GP or practice nurse before sending them to school.
Headache	A child with a minor headache does not usually need to be kept off school. If the headache is more severe or is accompanied by other symptoms, such as a raised temperature or drowsiness, then keep the child off school and consult your GP.	The school will not normally authorise an absence for headaches without medical evidence.
Vomiting and diarrhoea	Children with these conditions should be kept off school. They can return 48 hours after their symptoms disappear. Most cases of vomiting or diarrhoea get better without treatment.	If symptoms persist, consult your GP.
Sore throat	A sore throat alone does not have to keep a child from school.	The school will not normally authorise an absence for sore throat without medical evidence.
